#### **Bowls Are the New Plates**

New job for the 68-ounce serving bowl

In the world of eating, bowls are big.

Whether it is heaps of ravioli, salmon nestled in quinoa or eggs piled on grilled vegetables, many of today's biggest food trends call for bowls.

Sales of bowls are rising as Americans prefer more casual, one-course meals that layer flavors. Tableware makers are reconfiguring place settings. Restaurants are overhauling their china cabinets and consumers are increasingly cradling their food while perched at kitchen islands, lounging on sofas or multitasking at a table.

Fiesta, the collection of colorful and sturdy dishes, says its bowl sales increased about 17% last year, the largest gain of any Fiesta tableware. Bowls now account for about one-third of the brand's sales, says Rich Brinkman, vice president of the company's retail sales and marketing.

Mr. Brinkman says he anticipated a shift to bowls when sales of slow cookers started surging a few years ago. Calculating that most slow-cooked foods are eaten in bowls, in 2014 Fiesta introduced deep "bistro" bowls in 38-ounce and 68-ounce sizes. "Before, the average consumer would buy one 68-ounce bowl as a serving dish, and now they're buying six to eight of them," says Mr. Brinkman. "People are eating from them, not serving from them."

### Ceramics: The Figure in Clay- Celebrating the Human Form with Nadine Gay February 13-March 9<sup>th</sup> (6 Saturdays) 10:30-1pm

This is a structured class that will take you on an exploration of the human form. You'll be introduced to the work of artists which displays a wide range of interpretations from realistic to abstract. The aim is for you to express your creativity while learning modeling techniques and the structure and proportions of the human body. \$125 plus \$25 materials fee. Questions? ### Creating Slab Constructed Vessels From Drawing to Clay February 20<sup>th</sup>, 2-5pm.

We will discuss and carry out slab construction of vessels, starting with the process of visualizing their form and function. We will then sketch, create and modify templates, and construct unique slab built pieces. Students will learn new ways of visualizing and planning their work, new construction techniques, and will most importantly have fun! \$35 for instruction, \$15 materials.

## Pinch and coil building February 27<sup>th</sup>, 2-5pm.

Take your ceramics work to a new level in this hands-on ceramics class. We will explore the technique of pinch and coil building in a guided project constructing a functional pitcher and two cups. An emphasis on aesthetics as well as technique will encourage students to explore their ceramics practice in

new ways. Most importantly, students will have fun! \$35 for instruction, \$15 materials.

## Creative Surface Design in Clay Modeling, Applique and Reliefs March 12<sup>th</sup>, 2-5pm.

This fun and creative hands-on workshop focuses on creative surface design in clay. Students will learn about and practice techniques such as modeling, appliques, slip trailing, and relief work. Each student will create several greenware tiles during class to show their work (drop-in classes at the clay studio are available to glaze student work at a later date). \$35 for instruction, \$15 for materials.

# Alternative Glaze Application Techniques in Ceramics March 20<sup>th</sup>, 10-1pm.

This workshop focuses on alternative glaze techniques in ceramics. Go beyond painting and dipping to apply your glazes. Students will learn new techniques including, trailing, layering, stenciling, wax resist application, and other forms of glaze application onto bisqueware. Ceramics experience is required for this class: you should be comfortable with basic glazing practices. Bring several pieces of bisque ware to practice glaze techniques.
