New Security Measures Required

A major change in this year's Show involves security. Because of the planned attack on an Illinois Armory (and the subsequent attack on a Federal building in New York in August), all doors must be locked at all times, including during load-in and load-out, unless we have security personnel stationed at the doors. The Armory will have someone stationed in the lobby so load in can be done though the front doors. Load in on Thursday before the Show, will begin at noon and Jerry and I will serve as Security for the roll-up door at the back of the building. To use the four side doors, you will have to arrange for someone to wait at the door and open the door so you can come in (propping the doors open will not be allowed). There will be designated Aisle Hosts who will serve as Security at the back right-side door during the Show Friday night. Please rest assured that our Armory has not been threatened in any way, but the Federal government is requiring these cautionary security measures at ALL Federal Armories. By cooperating and working together, I know we can make security a small bump in the road during load-in and load out. I am looking into changes for the 2016 Show, which will make it easier for all of us.

Clayfolk Show and Sale


If you are participating in the 2015 Clayfolk Show and Sale or are on the wait list for the Show, please read the fire proof and electrical requirements and restriction. This information is also posted on our Website in the Members Only section.

There have been no changes since last year although there is **a new Fire Inspector** who will be checking our booths Friday afternoon. If you are using a pop-up, please remember that if the sides do not have a fireproof certification tag, they are NOT fireproofed. Twin sheets may be purchased for less than \$5.00 each at Walmart and can then be fireproofed.

Please note requirements for lighting and fireproofing for the 2015 Clayfolk Show:

Lighting: Extension cords must be three prong, grounded and at least 16-gauge (* 14 gauge is better). Power bars must be fused and UL approved. Attaching one power bar to another power bar in **NOT** allowed. In the past, a row of booths went dark so it's important that each booth does NOT exceed 500 watts. Group booth will be supplied with lighting. Pop up canopy frames (EZ-ups) are allowed without the top canopy. **and with fire proofed sides.**



Fabrics: All fabrics must be fireproofed. Unless treated with fire proofing material or unless they have a sticker, the side material on standard pop ups are NOT fireproof. The homemade recipe for natural fibers is 5 parts boric acid, 6 parts borax soap, 100 parts warm water by volume. Once dissoved, submerge the fabric in the solution. Hang up to dry. Do not dry in a clothes dryer Commericial sprays do not leave a white residue on the fabrics. Locally, you may purchase a MSDS certified spray fire proofing from Roley's Pacific Supply in Grants Pass 541-479-7578 (allow 3 days for shipping & ask for the MSDS certificate. Flamort Co. products can be ordered from www.flamort.com. 510-357-9494 (ask for the MSDS certificate) and Firez Off, an on-line Oklahoma company offers a certified spray at firezoff.com. or 405-702-0055. Last year, several of our members went together and purchased the fireproofing at the less expensive gallon price, saving money.

Our 40th Show is the perfect time to show our enthusiasm for our love of making pottery, as well as letting our community know how much we appreciate all the support we have received over the years. Cris Usher, in honor of our 40th Show, is organizing a contest where customers will vote for their favorite potter and favorite booth. Twenty-five dollars will be awarded to the two winners on Saturday afternoon. There will be cake for our customers Friday night, and I will be handing out balloons so that we can decorate our

booths for the celebration. A number of black and white photos will adorn our walls. Check out our website beginning in October for a walk down memory lane.

A few reminders: (1) Whether or not you are in the Show, you may work an extra shift and earn a point. Please contact him for an appointment at woodhillstudio@gmail.com, (4) If you cannot attend Booth Pick, please have someone there to pick your booth for you and act as your advocate. (5) At the Show, pre and post Show meetings are mandatory as are training meetings for people working in Sales, Price Tags, Greeters and Aisle Hosts, (6) Move-in packet will be sent out approximately two weeks prior to the Show.

I'm looking forward to seeing you at Booth Pick on October 18th at 2:30, in the Grants Pass Museum on G Street. Glazes! Glazes! Glazes!

As clay artists we are always looking for ways to make our ware convey a thought, exemplify beauty, or be unique. Glazes offer a way to create a feeling that your work is truly your own. Creating your own glazes adds a whole new aspect to your work as well the rewards of being the author of your own color pallet. This is a new column to explore techniques and tips of glaze creation and to share some the brainstorming that goes on at the Glaze Study Group.

This month I'll delve into the boring subject of record keeping. Unfortunately, not every glaze recipe or experiment we concoct and fire turns out successfully. Keeping track of failures is just as important as successes. Each time I mix up a batch and fire it on a test mouse or tile, I give it a number and then record that number on its own sheet in a 3 ring binder. I record the percentages of all the ingredients (of course), but also how it was fired. To get the most information from my test, I apply the glaze thinly in one area of the mouse and thick in another. If this is a glaze with colorants added, I dip the mouse in the mixture before the stain or oxides go in and then again with each additional colorant. This allows me to glean as much knowledge as I can with the least amount of effort. Example: If your recipe calls for 2% cobalt and 1% tin, you would dip once with no color, again with the cobalt and again after the tin is added. If you are not happy with the results, this knowledge can help you decide how to adjust the formula next time. Remember to get a glaze that suits your wants exactly, you almost always do multiple tests. Don't give experimenting is fun. Opening the kiln after firing test is truly like X-mas with all its joy and some of its disappointments. Wouldn't miss it for the world.

New Products that Might Just Work

Amaco and Brent have redesigned the *handle on their Brent* Clay Extruder HD.

This solid welded steel clay extruder features a safety design. Two sets of clutch plates lock the clutch body assembly firmly in place at any height setting for maximum leverage. Pull up on the top plates to raise the handle and plunger, or pull down on the bottom plates to lower them.

This design also assures equal pressure with any amount of clay in the barrel. This sounds really useful.

The heavy-duty steel 4" diameter barrel holds up to 10 lbs. of clay.

Another recent innovation is a glaze infused wax that changes the underlying glazes: The Ceramic Shop's own Mr. Mark's Wacky Wax is an innovative product that allows you to simultaneously combine surface decoration with color and wax resist. Mr. Mark's Wacky Wax can be applied on bisque ware or on top of glazes. Once fired, the wax burns out but the colors remain. Wacky Wax is available in eight colors, and it combines the rich colors and effects of glaze with the resist properties of wax for speedier decorating.
