One nice thing that happened to me was while sitting at my booth a customer came up and looked at one of my vases and asked me how I made it. I told him it was hand made with coils and I had put strips of burlap covered with clay slip all around the middle to lower part of the vase and a cheese grater was used to create ridges on the top part. There were 4 layers of glaze used on the pieces and a copper glaze was used on the collar and flux was used under the copper to cause some running. He said it was beautiful and would tell all his friends about me and recommend that they contact me. He said he had a perfect place at his home for the vase and bought it. 

Mold for a Bowl

11th-12th century

China

On view at The Met Fifth Avenue in Gallery 204

Molds such as this one were widely used in ceramic production in north China, particularly after the eleventh century, and are thought to have become common in an attempt to meet the growing demands for ceramic of various types at the time. As can be seen in the model bowl made using this mold, the clay was fitted over the mold in order to impress a design prior to covering the bowl with clay and firing it. Use of molds allowed for faster production than the hand-shaped and hand-carved decoration used earlier.



Our wood-fire kiln project chugs along. The piles of bricks have grown since the last report thanks to donations by a couple local ceramicists. Also, at the Clayfolk show some members



of Clayfolk and show attendees voiced an interest in donating kilns, bricks, metal, time, and skills to the project. Aside from continuing to gather donated material, we plan to break ground for the foundation January, and once the foundation has been established, start erecting a shed to go over the kiln area. In October, one of Clayfolk's founding members, retired ceramicist and kachelofen maker Dave Cornell, donated tons of firebrick to this project. Some of these bricks came from a defunct brick kiln in Klamath Falls. We were told years ago Dave and some fellow potters found a truck



to salvage these bricks, loaded as many as they could into the truck, divvied them up, and took them home.
Sounds like there was some question of whether the brakes on the truck would hold; they did. Dave plans to move soon and generously offered us these and other bricks.


Thanks Dave and JoAnne Eggers, too, for helping to make this donation happen.

Roxanne Hunnicutt also donated her retired gas kiln in October. Roxanne called and two days later my husband Monty and I showed up at her home to take it all away. Roxanne wondered if we could move it, as a logging truck had been used to lower the kiln into its spot which was on the other side of a gated fence area. With the help of a grinder and cut-off wheel and sheer human power we got it all through the gate, packed it up in our car and trailer, drove it home, and unpacked it. That was challenging weekend job! From Roxanne and Ross's kiln donation we collected not only the

bricks, but also angle iron, shelves, and some tall posts. Thanks, Roxanne and Ross.

At the Clayfolk show Nancy and Larry Nelson, former Clayfolk members offered us piles of bricks on their property. Former Clayfolk member Katy Cauker offered us her car kiln bricks for a dollar each; which is the fair market price for used refractory bricks I am told. In addition, Carole Paquin and Teri Hartnell-Nelson each offered kilns that they have but don't use. Others offering their support, time, and physical and mental effort to this kiln project include Julie Furrer, Ben Wood, Nancy Adams, Jim Nordal, Steve Wise, Roxanne Hunnicutt, Bill Robinson, and Todd. If I've missed you or you are now interested please contact me. The future kiln area has been cleared of trees and the footprint of the kiln tentatively identified. We hope to start digging the foundation when soil moistens and is easier to dig. We will likely begin to dig with people power and shovels to see what the ground holds and if shovels won't do it, we will likely turn to more mechanical earth moving equipment. After the trench is dug and flattened, we will need to provide stable base for the weight of kiln with gravel, concrete, concrete blocks, and soft brick, and hard refractory brick. We are still looking for team members, as well as materials for the kilna the the shed that will go over it. We all know reclaiming works best when the clay is bone dry. When you trim or carve your pieces, throw the scraps in an expanded metal trash can to air dry. It will take half the time to dry, and you can swish the empty container in a bucket of water to easily clean it out.
